We hope to be able to fit all those who wish to present a paper into the schedule but should the proposals be too many we reserve the right to make a selection. Time for the presentation will be 15 minutes.

There will be no fee for the seminar but meals are not included except for the welcome reception on May 27th.

Ottoman Flags and the Relief of Vienna 1683

As relics of victory, Ottoman flags from the 17th and 18th centuries have survived in different contexts in Europe, most importantly in museums that developed out of princely armouries and churches. Over the last century, Ottoman flags appeared in many exhibition catalogues linked to the connections between Europe and the Ottoman Empire. Viennas' museums still house over 70 Ottoman booty flags. Most of them are cotton flags, only three silk flags survive. Discussing two Ottoman silk banners from the wider Viennese context –both booty pieces - the paper will illustrate how these powerful carriers of Ottoman military identity were used for propaganda purposes once in inimical hands.
